

Winter Care for Young Plants & Trees

iving in a fairly newly developed area of the community, chances are your front yard vegetation has not yet matured to the point where it can stand extreme temperatures and/or little water. In an effort to help you nurture your young plants and trees into a well-established, beautiful landscape, we found the following information for your use.

Resist the urge to prune young trees! They will suffer in the long run for it. Allowing a young tree to grow as many branches as possible (from the ground up) will give it time to establish a thicker, more stable trunk because it has to "learn" to bear the weight of its new limbs. In general, a newly planted 15-gallon mesquite tree should not be significantly pruned or thinned for two full growing cycles. This will help to ensure its health and its ability to withstand a severe storm or high winds.

For young plants and trees, you may wish to consider decreasing the frequency of your watering to about once a week during the winter months. However, you will need to increase the duration of the watering to encourage deeper rooting. Take care not to over-water — remember, roots need air, too!

Small, young plants such as lantana, verbena, and honeysuckle

may have a tough time
adapting to transplanting
and cooling
temperatures. Keep a
close eye on them and,
if needed, cover them
at night whenever there
is a hard-frost warning.
If you lose a plant between

now and March, hold off on replacing it. Wait until March

when warmer temperatures and rains will make for a more successful transplant.

When you apply pre-emergent spray during the winter rains, the chemical will only affect seeds, not your trees and shrubs.

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


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Help Prevent Crime in Our Neighborhood

Did you know that we can take some simple steps to prevent crime in our neighborhood? Some crimes, such as thefts or break-ins, may be committed by people who don't necessarily fit the image of a criminal. The perpetrators of these crimes may loiter in the neighborhood, observing the activities of residents and choosing targets of opportunity.

- What can you do to reduce the potential of becoming a victim?
- It pays to be aware of anything that could be identified as "suspicious" activity.
- Always completely close your garage door, and keep it closed at all times unless you are in the immediate area.
- Be aware of the activity on your street, and get to know your neighbors and their families.
- Basically, anything that seems even slightly out of place or is occurring at an unusual time of day or night could be criminal activity. Here is a list of some of the most obvious activities to watch for and report to the police:
- Any vehicle moving slowly and without lights, or following an apparently aimless course.
- Vehicles containing one or more persons parked at unusual hours.
- Persons who do not live in your neighborhood and are hanging around the neighborhood.
- An usual volume of traffic frequently arriving and departing from a residence at various times of the day and night.

This list is by no means all-inclusive, but, as with all crime prevention, the responsibility has to be ours. The police can only advise from their experience—and we can use their advice to help our community remain a safe place to live.
