Here are the highlights of the annual meeting held October 28th in the Twin Peaks Elementary School auditorium. Completed draft minutes will be approved at the next annual meeting. They are posted to the website or a copy may be requested from the office staff.

All members of the Board of Directors were present. President, John Lambert verified the requirement for quorum and offered Proof of Meeting Notice. Minutes of the 2008 annual meeting were approved. The new management company staff was introduced.

Each Board member and committee chair gave reports of accomplishments, goals or on-going projects. All committees are in need of more volunteer support.

The only new business to come before the meeting was the Election Committee report acknowledging the results of the recent election to place four new members on the 2009-2010 Board of Directors for two-year terms. Stepping down from the Board are Colin Cordell, George Erhardt and Grant Winston. The fourth seat is currently held by Marilyn Stimpson, candidate for re-election. According to CRCA bylaws, the four elected by majority votes are: Peggy Bracken, Gus Lipins, Marilyn Stimpson and Terry Paschen. With Peggy Bracken not in attendance, a follow-up meeting could not take place in order to elect officers within the Board or establish a calendar of meetings for the coming year.

Mr. Lambert introduced Ms. Pat Fleming, State Representative, who agreed to make a return visit and conduct an open forum for residents of CRCA.

During open forum, the new traffic signal being installed at Coachline and Twin Peaks Boulevard was mentioned by a resident. Information or concerns will need to be requested from the Town of Marana.

The covenants committee most recently met Oct. 13 where we welcomed and became acquainted with our new staff representation from HOA Management Solutions, Bill Heady.

He is already conducting site tours and is inspecting 375 lots each day to ensure each area in the community is seen twice a month. This schedule allows time for violations to quickly be corrected and our community to remain in good condition while keeping our property values high.

Due to the lack of quorum of our board members, the September board meeting was cancelled. This meant that all proposed fines from covenants were put on hold for a month as the board could not approve them. In addition, the covenants committee could not move ahead with the business of reviewing fines and lot cleanups due to the transition of new management. We are hopeful that things will be back up and running for our November meeting. In November, the committee also intends to move forward on reviewing the current bylaws and CC&Rs for areas that may need to be changed to better suit the current needs of our community.




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Bicycle Safety Read This and Be Bike Smart!

Riding a bicycle is more than a form of basic transportation. It can be a fun and exciting hobby. But, when you ride, you're not alone. You share the road with cars, trucks, pedestrians, and other cyclists. Since accidents can turn a bicycle adventure into a bicycle mishap, here are some tips to help make your ride a safe and enjoyable one. Be bike smart!

Have safe equipment!

Take a few minutes to check over your bike. Make sure that tires have the right pressure and are in good shape. Check that the wheels spin freely and do not wobble. Make sure that your lights and reflectors are in good shape and securely fastened.

Wear a helmet!

Helmets can prevent head injuries, which are the primary cause of death and disabling injuries resulting from cycling accidents. Your helmet should fit correctly and meet safety standards.

Be seen!

The number one way to prevent being hurt in a crash is to prevent the crash! Wear brightly colored clothing and reflective strips on your clothing. Ride where crossing, passing, and approaching drivers can see you.

Be aware!

Watch for cars coming out of driveways remember, the driver might not see you. Look for cars opening their doors in front of you. Never wear headphones while riding. Watch for children who might run in front of you. Watch for potholes, debris, and storm drains.



Be predictable!

Don't surprise pedestrians, drivers, or other cyclists. Learn and use hand signals before turning and stopping. Check behind you before making sudden turns.

Follow the rules of the road!

Ride on the right with the traffic in a single-file line. Obey Stop signs and traffic lights. Never cross a road without checking for cars. When in doubt, always let the car go first. Give the right-of-way to pedestrians in crosswalks. Walk your bicycle on sidewalks whenever pedestrians are around. Have a bell or horn to let people know you are there.

Practicing these rules will keep you safe, sound, and on the road!

Fall Landscaping Tips

Ithough gardeners in most other regions are getting ready to hang up their gardening gloves for the year, we in Arizona are entering an active season. To assist homeowners with weed control and decorative planting for the upcoming months, we would like to provide the following information.

This is the time to sow most wildflower seeds for spring blooming. September and October are the last months to fertilize; plants need to slow their growth and allow new shoots to toughen so that they can withstand the frost and winter cold. Even plants that do not lose their leaves need less water and have a dormant period during the cold weather.

If you would like to install a spectacular fall shrub or tree in your yard, now is the time of year to go to the nursery and choose a plant. Even plants of the same species can differ in the color and/or intensity of their fall color; to get the precise fall color show you desire, pick the plant out when it is showing its stuff!

Any plant that is cold-hardy in our climate is safe to plant now. Please remember to check your ARC Guidelines for allowable planting. It is important to check your stakes on newly planted trees. Stakes are meant to stabilize the tree only temporarily after it is removed from the nursery stake. Stakes should be removed six months to two years after planting, depending on the height of the tree at planting. The tree must be able to sway in the wind to develop strength in its trunk, allowing the stake to be removed sooner and giving the tree a good start in developing the strength it needs to withstand storms.

Holiday Fun Facts

For every real Christmas tree harvested, 2 to 3 seedlings are planted in its place. Each hectare provides the daily oxygen requirements of 45 people.

Three years after Thomas Edison invented the electric light bulb in 1879, Edward H. Johnson, who worked for Edison's company, had Christmas tree bulbs especially made for him. He proudly displayed his electric tree lights at his home on Fifth Avenue, New York City. They caused a sensation, although some years were to pass before mass-manufactured Christmas tree lights were widely available.

In America in 1822, the postmaster of Washington, DC, complained that he had to add 16 mailmen at Christmas to deal with cards alone. He wanted the number of cards a person could send limited by law. "I don't know what we'll do if this keeps on," he wrote.

Holiday Safety Tips

As the holiday season rapidly approaches, it's wise to take certain precautions to help keep your days merry and bright. Here are a few suggestions

Safeguarding Your Home

- 1. Turn on lights and a radio or TV so that it appears that someone is home.
- 2. Don't display gifts where they can be seen from outside.
- 3. Properly dispose of boxes from audio

equipment, TVs, VCRs, etc., by cutting them up and recycling them.

4. Don't advertise to a thief by simply placing the boxes at the curb.

5. If you have a holiday tree, turn off the tree lights when you are away from your home. Check your tree often for excessive dryness.

6. Don't forget to note the serial numbers of your gifts and store the numbers in a safe place.

Vacation Planning

1. Stop all deliveries or arrange for a neighbor or friend to pick up your mail, newspapers, and packages.

2. Have good locks on all doors and windows AND USE THEM!

3. Plug in timers to turn lights and radio on and off at appropriate times.

4. Never leave your house key hidden outside under a doormat, in a flower pot, etc. Someone other than a friend or family member is bound to find it!

Practicing these common-sense tips will help keep you, your family, and your belongings safe and sound!

Protect Yourself from Identity Theft

Identity theft occurs when a crook steals pieces of personal identifying information, such as name, address, date of birth, Social Security number, and mother's maiden name, to gain access to a person's financial accounts. Most identity theft involves the U.S. Mail. That's why the U.S. Postal Inspection Service is a lead agency in investigating incidents of identity theft.

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service urges you to add these tips to your "must do" list to protect your identity

- Don't leave mail in your mailbox overnight or on weekends.
- Deposit mail in U.S. Postal Service collection boxes.
- Tear up or shred unwanted documents that contain personal information.
- Review your consumer credit report annually.
- If you suspect you're victim of ID theft and the crime involved the U.S. Mail, report it to your nearest U.S. Postal Inspection Service office.

Taking care of those pesky weeds

ne of the priorities of a homeowners association is to make sure that the community looks its best, so that property values will continue to increase. Frequently this means addressing a subject that refuses to go away namely, weeds and yard maintenance!

Weeds are just about the most dreaded subject of any community association. No matter how often you try to remove them from your yard, they keep coming back. And the hot days and warm nights make it especially difficult to keep up with the proliferation of weeds in the community.

Therefore, we are taking the opportunity to remind residents to remove weeds on a regular basis from your front and side yards. Whether you prefer the latest herbicidal treatment or old-fashioned elbow grease, weeds are far easier to contend with if you can manage to stay one step ahead of them.

If you are using a herbicide, early spring is the best time to begin pre-emergent spraying for summer weeds, before they begin to sprout. Pre-emergent herbicide must be applied early, since it is not effective once a seedling has fully sprouted. Postemergent treatment (as the name suggests) is applied after the weeds are visible above ground.

If you plan to leave town during any part of the summer, please make arrangements for someone to maintain your property during your absence.

If you're weeding by hand, now is the perfect time to pull up those little green desert brooms, before they develop their tenacious taproots. Desert broom is one of Tucson's peskiest weeds, especially where allergies are concerned.

And while you are busy pulling out the weeds, please take a few moments to remove dead plant material lying in your yard and to trim back bushes, which will promote new growth.


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


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
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Got Junk?
