President's Report

The BOD approved the proposed budget at the August BOD meeting, which means homeowner dues will remain the same for 2011. The BOD would like to thank the Finance Committee for all the hard work to come up with a budget for next year that does not require an increase in dues, while maintaining the common areas and facilities to the high standard we should expect as homeowners. If you are having trouble meeting the obligation of paying your dues, please contact management so that a payment plan can be arranged and we do not have to turn it over to collections.

In past years the BOD relied on CC&R violations as a source of income to the Association. The fiscal year 2007-2008 saw \$66,230.00 in fines collected from homeowners. The Finance committee and BOD agreed that this should not be considered as income in making the budget for 2010-2011. We have budgeted zero dollars from fines under income. This does not mean that the CC&Rs are not being enforced—fines are still a method to achieve compliance with the documents we all signed. The management company attempts to resolve violations by communicating with the homeowners before sending violation notices, which in most cases has been quite successful. Fines levied by the Board are available if cooperation with owner is not achieved and the violation continues to occur.

September Recap: Board Meeting

The following are highlights from the regular meeting of the Board of Directors held 18 August 2010 at the Community Center. Completed minutes are posted to the website in draft format and will be approved at the next regular meeting in September. A copy may also be requested from the office staff.

Consent Agenda Approvals

Receipt of committee minutes and June/July 2010 financials received. Replacement of plants at cost not to exceed \$2,546 (within budget); in Marbella II, extending grouted rip-rap, additional plantings, replenishing decorative rock, for a combined total of \$14,600 (within budget); upper tree maintenance proposal from Bfijer Resources at a cost not to exceed \$13,000 (within budget). Appoint Mrs. Nancy Lambert to Landscape Committee.

Treasurer's Report

As of 31 July 2010: Operating cash, \$375,762.59; Reserves, \$1,112,538.92 including restricted SCA Mitigation Fund; Accounts Receivable, \$189,193.65; total assets, \$1,677,495.16.

Board Actions

Approved \$18,000 for granite upgrades throughout the community. Authorization for Board Liaisons to meet committee quorum requirements when necessary for conduct of routine business. One parking violation to be turned over to the Town of Marana; one parking violation to be handled by Management. Acceptance of proposed budget for 2010-2011. Denied acceptance of ARC-proposed change to Design Guidelines. Upheld ARC decision to not approve resident's proposed aluminum patio roof; suggested resident consider a different roof design and re-submit a new plan. Certification of three nominees for election, pending any resident petitions received prior to 21 August 2010 in accordance with CRCA bylaws. Accepted as date of record, 20 October 2010, for CRCA Annual Meeting, 7:00 p.m. in Twin Peaks Elementary School. Pool monitors' schedule has been revised; Windmill Park pool will remain heated; Kiddie Pool at Center will remain heated until 1 October; Community Center pool heating to be turned off now, all as cost-savings considerations.

Denied request of Redeemer Lutheran School for temporary use of pool facility for physical education students. Approved Mr. Clint G. Goodman, Mesa, AZ as continuing CRCA attorney. Approved Management personnel to inspect homes upon sale/transfer in order to maintain resident files/accuracy of documentation. Approval of Bates Asphalt to reclaim and repave Windmill Park parking lot at cost not to exceed \$27,875.90 (\$26,350 in Reserve Fund). Approved reorganization of Board positions as a result of recent resignation of 1st VP—Ms. Marilyn Stimpson to 1st VP, Ms. Connie DeLarge to 2nd VP; Mr. Gus Lipins to Treasurer. Approved to not pursue getting bids to repaint the Silvermoon Wall, Parcel 17. Motion to reject a proposal to upgrade the Community Center sign planter box was denied. Mr. Lambert noted that newly-installed Town of Marana street signs indicate "Coachline Avenue" and need to be corrected to "Coachline Boulevard."

Board Discussion

Continuing discussions regarding proposed change to current Design Guidelines; no decision reached; ARC to write a new proposal, abiding by the Specific Plan and the CC&Rs. Election Committee appointments to be made via Action in Lieu. Area Boy Scouts sifted the sand in the Windmill Park play area as a community service project and provided a great cost savings to the Association. A letter of appreciation will be prepared.

Manager's Report

Community Manager indicated primary focus of the team is to serve the owners within Continental Ranch and the Board of Directors. New to the staff is Ms. Aime Salinas, replacing Ms. Fran Burke. Mr. Kyle Nickel is transitioning to be the ARC liaison in addition to duties with Covenants' issues; Mr. Josh Seng continues to handle pool, landscape and facilities issues; Ms. Jocelyn Canovali handles activities and newsletter duties. The office maintains a Monday to Friday 10-hour work day plus one Saturday each month. Authorization was requested to close the office for 20 minutes each Monday for routine staff meetings. Ongoing efforts include gopher bids, bollards, light pole installation at the Center parking lot, asphalt bids, scanning and storing archived documents digitally (beginning in November), budget, elections, annual meeting, etc.

Landscape Committee:

Researching, Identifying, & Prioritizing

"The Landscape Budget

The Landscape Committee has been working diligently to research, identify, and prioritize areas of Continental Ranch that would most benefit from improvement and fall within this year's budget for new projects. One area identified is across from the entrance to Sunflower on Twin Peaks Road. The

Committee has concluded that this section looks somewhat "unfinished", and has recommended plans for upgrading this area to the Board.

The general landscape maintenance contract includes routine maintenance of trees within the Association up to 15 feet. As in years past, the Board budgeted an amount to be applied towards the pruning and thinning of the Association's trees above the 15-foot routine maintenance height. The Committee

has selected a local tree care contractor for this year's tree pruning, approved by the Board in August. The tree pruning should take place as the growing season comes to an end in late September through October.

The Committee is also reviewing an item from the Association's Reserve Study calling for annual replenishment of decorative rock throughout the Association. Over time, the decorative rock slowly becomes depleted. The Committee will be deciding on a site priority list for replenishing this component of the Association's landscape.

One project under review for several months includes enhancement of the Monument entryways to neighborhoods within Continental Ranch. The Committee is committed to finalizing plans for this project so that the work can be done in the fall.

A list of dead plants has been compiled during 2010 to follow the board directive of replacing lost plants with new ones of like kind. A goal of the Board and the Landscape Committee is keeping Continental Ranch's landscape in top condition. The Board approved the Committee's recommendation

to replace these plants after the temperatures decrease.

In addition to this list of known dead plants in 2010, the landscape along Coachline was found to contain a high number of drip-irrigation emitters that run to bare spots, indicating that many plants were lost in years past and never replaced. The Committee is developing a plan to replenish these areas.

The Landscape Budget for next year, which was accepted by the Board,

was developed to address plans for completing more unfinished areas of Continental Ranch and to upgrade the

landscape along Twin Peaks.
The new entry point to
Continental Ranch from
Interstate-10 to Twin Peaks
Road is almost finished,
and the Committee is
assessing the eastern
section of Twin
Peaks Road to create
a more aesthetically
pleasing landscape,

thus adding value to

the Community.

ARC: Remember Town Guidelines, Too

The CRCA Architectural Committee has worked very hard during the last year and a half to streamline the application process and make life easier on residents who wish to update their homes. Each month, we at the ARC try to write about certain situations that have confronted us at our meetings. Once in a while, we find that certain items may not be as clear in the Design Guidelines as we had hoped.

We try very hard to make applicants aware that the Town of Marana also has guidelines that may not be exactly like ours. Sometimes building permits are required by the Town of Marana that may not seem necessary to you.

We would like to remind you to please check with the Town of Marana before you start a project because not having the necessary building permits may delay our ability to approve your application. The ARC simply requests that, if a permit is required by the Town, it is obtained and turned in with your application. This helps eliminate potential issues in the future. You can contact the Town at 382-1999, or call the Association office at 297-7600, if you have any questions.

If anyone has a couple of hours a month to get involved in the ARC, we would welcome your efforts to keep CRCA on the homeowner friendly track we have chosen to follow. All you need to do is come to a meeting and express your interest.

Our meetings are held at 7:00 p.m. on the first Thursday of each month and at 2:00 p.m. on the third Thursday of each month. Both meetings are held at the Windmill Park Office.

This 'N That...

For most of us, Labor Day (September 6th) is just another holiday incorporating a three-day week-

end. What we so often forget is that Labor Day is really quite unique; it's not dedicated to any particular person, race or organization, and there's no pressure to send cards or purchase flowers! Labor Day is the observance of the value and dignity of actual work by American workers and the significance of it in sustaining our daily way of life. It serves as a pleasant reminder that the long, hot summer is soon coming to an end; autumn is on the way and we can finally open doors and windows to enjoy some comfortable fresh air throughout the day!

The first L.D. was celebrated in September 1882 in New York City. By 1885 the holiday became so popular that it had spread throughout the country and was known as "Workman's Holiday." Controversy still prevails regarding the person who first proposed this special day for American workers, but suffice to know that Canada and a number of other industrialized nations now recognize Labor Day as a national holiday along with us!

GREEN GRASS IN WINTER: OVERSEEDING

Green Grass in Winter

Late September to mid-October marks a major milestone for turf landscapes in the desert. At this time, those who want to maintain green parks and lawns through the winter need to overseed Bermuda grass with winter Ryegrass.

Bermuda grass, which grows well in the summer, turns brown and goes dormant with the first frost and remains that way until spring. Ryegrass however, stays green and vibrant through the cooler months, with the exception of heavily shaded areas, and will die out with the return of triple-digit temperatures.

Steps for Overseeding Your Lawn

- Timing is critical. The ideal time to overseed is when nighttime temperatures are regularly below 65 degrees (typically mid-October). About 2 weeks prior to overseeding, reduce the amount
 - of irrigation water to the Bermuda by about half. This will signal the Bermuda to slow its growth and store energy for the winter.
- 2 In order to successfully spread the Ryegrass seed, you need to prepare the seedbed for planting. Lower the mowing height on your lawn mower in several passes, taking off about 1/4 inch each mow cycle until the grass is approximately 3/4 inch in

height. Make sure to remove the clippings by mowing with a bag-catcher or by raking them up. The goal for this process is to make sure the Ryegrass seed comes into direct contact with the soil.

3 Now you are ready for seeding. For the best results, use perennial Ryegrass seed. Use a rotary spreader or



drop spreader to evenly distribute the seed at a rate of 8 to 10 pounds per thousand square feet. To maximize germination, lightly rake and then cover the lawn with ½ inch of mulch. Apply a starter fertilizer (6-20-20 or 6-24-24) after the seed is down. Water the area after spreading the Ryegrass seed, and set your irrigation clock to water 3 to 4 times a day at approximately 2 to 5 minute cycles. This schedule ensures the soil and mulch remain moist, and not overly wet, until germination. This step should take 7 to 10 days.

After the seedlings emerge, reduce watering to once daily. When the grass reaches about 2 inches in height,

it is time for the first mow. Cut the grass to about 1½ inch in height and fertilize with a 21-7-14 fertilizer. Make sure to water immediately following the fertilizer application. Depending on temperatures and rainfall, you can then reduce the watering schedule to once every 2 or 3 days. To keep your lawn from turning yellow, fertilize every 3 to 6 weeks with ammonium nitrate (34-0-0) or calcium nitrate. Apply all fertilizers according to the directions on the package.



Use a rotary spreader to distribute seed.

By following these steps, you should achieve a lush, green lawn through the winter months and into spring. When triple-digit temperatures return, it will be time to transition from the Ryegrass back to the Bermuda grass.





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
