January & February Recap: Meetings At A Glance

The following are highlights from the regular meetings of the Board of Directors held January 16, 2018 and February 20, 2018 at the Community Center. Completed minutes will be posted to the website after they are approved at the next appropriate meeting. A copy of approved minutes may also be requested from the office. Recordings of all meetings will be retained for a period of 30 days following posting of approved minutes to the website.

Board Actions

At the January 16, 2018 meeting, the Board approved several Covenants Committee recommendations for fines and pool use suspensions for various unresolved violations; approved annual upper tree pruning; approved renewal of the association's insurance policy; approved a covenants fine waiver; approved design guideline update regarding pergolas. At the February 20, 2018 meeting, the Board approved several Covenants Committee recommendations for fines and pool use suspensions for various unresolved violations; approved replacement of pool chlorinators, following the reserve study; approved additional deck cleaning service with pool maintenance contract; approved renewal of summer swim lessons using Saguaro Aquatics; approved replacement of storage shelves in storage shed.


Manager's Report

The community manager provided his report to the Board which included the status of all projects recently completed and/or currently underway since the previous Board meeting.



against the law to not scoop your poop. It is not limited to just Windmill Park but throughout CRCA. Please be considerate of your neighbors and don't wait for the Poop Fairy to appear - scoop your dog's poop.

I thought it was time to call the attention of homeowners and businesses in CRCA to a portion of your property taxes for which you receive no benefit- what I would call a "taxation without representation" sort of thing. I am referring to the part of your tax bill that reads "CMID". This CMID tax is assessed by the Cortaro Marana Irrigation District for which you are levied \$69 per acre (or percentage of an acre) on your property taxes each year. CMID (aka Cortaro Water Users Association) has been in existence since 1919 and services approximately 70 irrigation customers. Before Continental Ranch was first developed in the mid-80's, the area was farmland owned by lettuce grower Bud Antle. I am sure that Mr. Antle used the services of CMID to water his fields. I find it quite disturbing that over 90% of CRCA- as well as the businesses at the Arizona



Pavilions- are included in the CMID water district for tax purposes and we receive nothing in return other than the privilege of offsetting some costs to the 70 customers who use CMID water for irrigation. Doing a rough calculation CMID receives in excess of \$70,000 a year from properties in CRCA and give nothing back to us in return. This map shows the boundaries of CMID for taxation purposes. Is there anything we can do to stop paying for something we receive no benefit from? We can petition the Pima County Board of Supervisors to be excluded from this taxing district. If you are interested in lowering your tax bill please contact the office for a petition. This will not happen without a lot of homeowners voicing their opinion.



Home Improvements - Shade Sails

Spring is in the air and it's the season for home improvement projects! The Association understands that it can be a little bit of a chore to get approval from the HOA on improvement projects but CRCA tries to make the process as simple and streamlined as possible for its residents. The application approval process is necessary to maintain the community standards.

One type of improvement which has been coming up more often recently are the addition of fabric shade sails to backyards. These shade sails are permissible; however, there are HOA guidelines pertaining to them,



and they do require HOA approval. The Association hopes that homeowners will take the time to follow the application process and gain approval prior to installing their shade sails, rather than installing something without approval that will ultimately be required to be removed if it does not comply with the CRCA Design Guidelines.

Maintaining Community Assets

It was a busy "winter" these past few months at the community's pools! Both Windmill Park Pool and the Community Center Pool underwent major renovations to replace the plaster with new material. After much

deliberation and review, the Board decided to upgrade the pools from standard plaster to the Pebble Tec product. Pebble Tec is known for its superior durability and improved longevity as compared to traditional pool plaster.

By spending a slightly higher amount to get the upgraded product, the Board



hopes that the community will benefit from a much longer lasting product. The Board hopes that the members of CRCA will appreciate their strategic financial decisions and commitment to maintaining the community assets.

As of the publication of this edition of the newsletter, the Windmill Park pool was completed and ready for use on March 1st; the Community Center was still in the prep phase of the process and expected to be completed by the end of March.

Community Bulk Item Trash Pickup Saturday April 21, 2018

Waste Management will be in your neighborhood to pick up bulk trash items. Residents must have an account with Waste Management to participate.

Keep in mind: **Our drivers load your bulk items into the truck <u>by hand</u>.** Please follow these guidelines to ensure a successful pickup and to keep your neighborhood clean and safe. If the criteria are not met, we will not be able to load and pick up items.

General Guidelines

- Place all bulk items on the curb by 6:00 a.m.
- Bulk items must weigh less than 50 pounds. Driver cannot remove items exceeding this limit.
- Items must be contained within a 4 ft. by 4 ft. area

Guidelines for Common Items

- Bundle all landscape items. Branches and bundles cannot exceed 4 feet in length.
- Cactus must be boxed and labeled.
- Remove mattresses from hide-a-beds to reduce weight.
- For glass tables, please remove, box and label the glass.

NOT Acceptable Items:

- Appliances including:
 - Refrigerators/Freezers
 - Ice Makers
 - Washers/Dryers
 - o Stoves
 - o **Dishwashers**
 - $\circ \quad \text{Water Heaters} \quad$
 - $\circ \quad \text{Air Conditioners}$
 - Appliances with Freon
 - Electronics including:
 - Televisions
 - Computers
- Tires
- Batteries
- Fluorescent bulbs and/or ballasts

- 55-gallon drums
- Chemicals including:
 - Pesticides
 - o Oil
 - o **Paint**
 - Turpentine
 - Any flammable liquids
- Propane/Gas Cylinders
- Asbestos Material
- Medical Waste
- Contaminated soil or any liquid hazardous waste
- Railroad Ties
- Construction material

Home Landscaping Tips

As springtime approaches, it is time to fertilize and cut everything back. I am always hesitant to cut frost sensitive plants back in February, whereas March is definitely a safe time to cut back and fertilize everything and get ready for the growing season.

The problem with fertilizing too early and cutting the frost damage out too early, is that it encourages new growth and opens the plant up to frost damage further down the plant if it frosts again. The "normal" last danger of frost for Tucson is around March 8 to March 15, but usually it is much sooner than that. So, March is a great time to fertilize and prune everything.

Fertilizing citrus trees is not necessary for the tree to grow, but fertilizer is necessary if you want it to thrive and produce sweet juicy fruit. Three applications of citrus tree fertilizer are recommended each year. To determine how much fertilizer to use, carefully follow the directions on the label. As a general rule, a mature citrus tree can take up to 2 pounds of fertilizer for each application (but be sure to follow the label and only apply fertilizer designed for use on citrus). A 5lb bag can do 2 to 3 mature trees per application. March is usually an ideal time for the first application because the danger of frost is past. Try to fertilize before the blossoms come out. If you fertilize while the tree is blooming, the fertilizer can knock the blooms off before they get a chance to set fruit. If you miss this timing, just wait until the next recommended application period, which is May/June.



Citrus trees prefer deep watering. Beth Hargrove, from

Rillito Nursery and Garden Center, recommends watering to a depth of 3ft once a week during the warm growing season. To accomplish deep watering use drip irrigation or build a watering well to contain the water as it seeps down deep to the roots. You may need to fill up the well a couple of times to reach the 3' depth. A watering well should be as wide as the canopy of the tree if possible. Remember the roots of a tree mimic the branches, so the roots extend out just as far as the branches do. This is where the important feeder roots are, which take up water and nutrients. The older roots that are closer to the trunk are more for anchoring the tree. It is recommended to put an inner circle of soil around (but not touching) the trunk so that standing water won't get the trunk wet. If you use drip irrigation make sure to put three or four, 4-gph drippers out about mid way around the tree to insure water gets to all the roots and not just one central area.

Hopefully you have trimmed your roses back hard in January and sprayed them for fungi and insects in February, as they have started to sprout. If you haven't trimmed them hard, do some medium pruning and spraying now. We don't want to have to do heavy pruning in the summer on roses.

The Texas Mountain Laurels (Sophora secundiflora) started to bloom in mid-February. Get ready for "leaf skeletonizer" pests on them and all of the Yellow Bell genus (Tecoma species), Yellow Bells, Orange Jubilee, and the multitude of other colors. Look for the little green caterpillars now, because by the time you notice the damage, it is usually severe. Check with your landscaper or favorite garden center for the proper control. Get to those weeds too. This was a great year for weeds. Lots of winter rains.

We are only a few weeks away from the start of spring! With the relatively mild winter and the recent rains, we can soon expect our desert vegetation to come alive. Please remember to maintain your property so that it is free of weeds and that all bushes, shrubs and trees are maintained so that they do not block pedestrian or vehicular access and/or visibility. As a reminder, all trees that go over the sidewalk need to be trimmed so that they provide at least eighty inches of unobstructed clearance for pedestrians. Additionally, trees that encroach into the roadway, and especially trees located near intersections, need to be trimmed so that no traffic signs are obstructed and vehicles can safely travel. We recommend trimming these trees to a height of twelve feet.

Spring is also a time when more people get out to enjoy our beautiful weather. If you are taking your dogs out with you, please remember that both state and local laws require that your dog remain physically under your control at all times with a leash or similar device. There are very few exceptions to this rule, such as when your dog is located within an approved and authorized dog park. This is a public safety issue designed to keep everyone safe, including your pets.
