



for their actions. Many times residents will call our office to report something after the fact. If there's any chance of catching the kids who are misbehaving and stopping the issue, the incident needs to be



reported immediately when it is witnessed, and needs to be reported directly to the police. By reporting it to the HOA office, the HOA office will then need to call the police and report it as second hand information, instead of being reported by the eye-witness. After reporting the incident to the police, it would then be appreciated to notify the office so that the HOA can follow up to resolve any damage that occurred.

The following are highlights from the regular meetings of the Board of Directors held March 20, 2018 and April 17, 2018 at the Community Center. Board Actions

At the March 20, 2018 meeting, the Board approved several Covenants Committee recommendations for fines and pool use suspensions for various unresolved violations; approved repaint of Windmill and Community Center pool fencing along with all monument signs in Continental Ranch; approval of annual

flower replacement for monument beds; approval of 2018 seasonal pool monitor staff budget; approval of Community Center rental policy update; approval of security camera system replacement for Windmill Park and Community Center. At the April 17, 2018 meeting, the Board approved several Covenants Committee recommendations for fines and pool use suspensions for various unresolved violations; approved irrigation repairs on Twin Peaks Road median; appointed members for the 2018 Nominating Committee.

Manager's Report

The community manager provided his report to the Board which included the status of all projects recently completed and/or currently underway since the previous Board meeting.

CRCA Swimming Pool Rules

Accounts past due will have their pool key card turned off until payment is received.

- Association rules, regulations, and all posted signs must be followed. Lifeguards are not on duty. Swim at your own risk.
- 2. You must conduct yourselves safely and in a manner that does not interfere with the enjoyment of the pool and spa by all participants.
- 3. Pool Staff and others designated by the Board of the Directors have the authority to enforce these rules, and not allow entry to those not willing to abide by them.
- 4. The Windmill Park and Community Center swimming pools are only for the use of residents and their guests. Residents must accompany their guests at all times. Limit of 5 guests per card holder. For larger groups, permission must be received from the Continental Ranch Administrative Office. Authorized staff has the right to limit the number of guests using the facility on any day. Maximum occupancy in swimming pool area is 120 people. No more than 90 people can be in the water at any time.
- 5. Children under 12 years old must be attended by an adult over the age of 18 at all times.
- 6. Children under the age of 15 are not allowed in the spa under any circumstances.
- 7. Proper swim suit attire is required in the pool. No cutoffs or street clothing allowed.
- 8. Do not prop open the gates to the pool or restrooms.
- 9. You must shower prior to entering the pool or spa. Use of soaps and/or shampoos is prohibited.
- Please remember to only walk on the deck. No diving. No running or horseplay permitted on the deck or in the pool. Only use appropriate "pool toys" and flotation devices in pool area.
- 11. Do not enter the pool if you have an infectious or contagious disease, open cuts, sores or bandages.
- 12. Children in diapers must wear secure fitting waterproof pants over the diapers.
- 13. No defecating, urinating, spitting, or placing other foreign substances in the pool. Do not swim if you are incontinent or suffering from diarrhea.
- 14. No glass containers permitted in the pool area.
- 15. No food, drinks, drugs, or tobacco are allowed inside the pool area, except for water.
- 16. No pets of any kind permitted in the pool area, except for working "Service Dogs".
- 17. Please deposit all trash in the containers provided.
- 18. Abusive behavior and vandalism is prohibited: No climbing on walls and gates. No fighting. No use of the pool outside of posted pool hours or during inclement weather.
- 19. Bicycles, skateboards, roller skates, roller blades and riding toys must be parked outside the pool area.
- 20. Only use battery operated audio equipment with earphones.
- 21. If using suntan lotion, place a towel over the chair to protect it from oil damage.
- 22. Scuba equipment is not allowed except during class instruction approved by the Board of Directors.
- 23. Keep clear of swimming lanes when used by lap swimmers. Do not hang on or play with lane lines.
- 24. Do not interfere with emergency procedures, accidents or drill exercises, including handling of pool equipment.
- 25. Continental Ranch Community Association and staff is not responsible for valuables left in the pool area.
- 26. Only one card issued per household. Replacement fee charged for lost cards: 1st time \$10, 2nd time \$15, 3rd time, and thereafter \$20.
- 27. Violation of any pool rule(s) will result in a 30-day suspension of pool privileges and a \$25 fine.

WEED MANAGEMENT

Weeds can be a homeowner's worst nightmare, conjuring thoughts of back-breaking hours digging and pulling, or compliance notices if they aren't removed. You can avoid both of these headaches very easily this season. Continental Ranch Community Association once again offers the semi-annual program for your common area landscape maintenance contractor, Environment Control, to spray pre-emergent herbicide in your front yard to prevent most weeds before they have a chance to become a problem.





- If no rain occurs within two weeks after the spray is applied, please water in the pre-emergent using a garden hose.
- Application of pre-emergent can greatly reduce the number of weeds that germinate.
- Pre-emergent herbicides are designed to prevent seeds from germinating in the soil **existing weeds should be removed** prior to pre-emergent application
- Pre-emergent herbicide does not affect living plant material such as trees and shrubs so the rest of your landscape will not be harmed in the process.





WANT TO KEEP THE WEEDS OUT OF YOUR YARD?

Environment Control will be offering pre-emergent preventative weed spraying for Continental Ranch homeowners at a rate of \$40.00 per front yard. Spraying will take place June 4th - June 13th. Home Landscaping Tips

What a great year for roses. If you got your roses pruned, sprayed, and fertilized on time, you were rewarded with a great shower of blooms.

If you have been following me for the last several years, it probably seems like I keep talking about the same things. Unfortunately, or maybe fortunately, we always see the same problems each season, year after year. The pests we see at this time of year are: spider mites, leaf skeletonizers, and cutter bees. Aphids are on their way out, not too much to worry about. Cutter bees don't hurt the plant, other than cosmetics. Cutter bees come in and cut out a semi-circle out of the leaf and take it away to build their nest. Some of the plants that are affected are Bougainvillea, Roses, and Hibiscus. There is no control for them. Spider mites, on the other hand, can kill plants. The plants most affected by spider mites are: rosemary, hibiscus, roses, bottle brush, and conifer type plants; junipers, arborvitae, and cypress. The telltale sign for spider mite damage is a dusty dull look to the plant. Upon closer inspection, tiny webbing will be noticed. Take a small branch sample in a plastic bag into your favorite garden center to get the proper diagnoses and cure, or make sure your landscaper knows about it. Leaf skeletonizers will devour and kill the plant if you let it get away from you. These are caterpillars that eat the green of the leaves, leaving a skeleton of the leaf. Again, get with your favorite garden center for proper diagnoses and control. Plants most affected: Texas Mountain Laurel, Arizona Bells, and Bougainvillea.



I have been dealing with 'Little John' Bottle Brush problems lately. We typically have three different bottle brushes that we grow here. There is a tree, a large shrub, and a dwarf shrub variety. They all have the same problems, which are mainly two; spider mites and iron chlorosis. Both of these take time and regular attention to get the plant back to a healthy condition. I have described the symptoms for spider mites above. In addition to the product the nursery recommends, hosing down the infected plant prior to the insecticide application will help. The symptoms for iron chlorosis are yellowing leaves with green veins, eventually turning brown and dying if not treated. The cure for iron chlorosis is giving the plant iron. Not just any iron though. Chelated iron is what is needed. I get my chelated iron from Rillito Nursery, they have several different forms. Get with them to see which form will work best for you. I use KeRex in the powder form, approximately \$30.00 for a 5 pound bag. This form of iron is very strong and faster acting than iron sulfate (i.e. Ironite), so follow the directions on the package very closely and don't over fertilize. As I said, these problems take time to solve; one treatment of each is not enough. Expect to do at least 3 or 4 treatments to correct each one of these problem. Spider mites and iron chlorosis in bottle brush seem to go hand in hand, so if your bottle brush looks stressed, it probably has both problems.

Plants need fertilizer when they are actively growing. Follow the directions on the fertilizer label very carefully. If you use too much you will burn the roots and damage or kill the plant. You may want to do a little less than what the label says, just to be safe. Some fertilizers are very fast acting, organic fertilizers tend to be safer and slower acting. Typically fertilizer labels recommend fertilizing every 6 weeks or so.

Get things trimmed up, sprayed, and fertilized so your plants will have less stress on them to deal with the stress of the heat.






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
Continental Ranch | March 2018

In the Continental Ranch area, February 2018 active inventory was 30, a 3% increase from February 2017. There were 23 closings in February 2018, a 35% increase from February 2017. Year-to-date 2018 there were 46 closings, a 31% increase from year-to-date 2017. Months of Inventory was 1.3, down from 1.7 in February 2017. Median price of sold homes was \$200,000 for the month of February 2018, virtually unchanged from February 2017. The Continental Ranch area had 34 new properties under contract in February 2018, up 62% from February 2017.

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
