# March & April Recap: Meetings at a Glance

The following are highlights from the regular meetings of the Board of Directors held March 16, 2021 and April 20, 2021 at the community center. Completed minutes will be posted to the website after they are approved at the next appropriate meeting. A copy of approved minutes may also be requested from the office. Recordings of all meetings will be retained for a period of 30 days following posting of approved minutes to the website.

### **Board Actions**

At the March 16, 2021 meeting, the Board approved recommendations from the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) to revise Design Guidelines sections for 'Driveways,' 'Walls,' 'Flag Poles,' 'Gazebos,' and 'Storage Shed' – board recommendations for 'Garage Addition' and 'Guest Residence' referred to ARC for review; approved proposal from AAA Landscape to install new landscaping in common area on North Long Creek Drive; approved proposal from AAA Landscape to replenish decomposed granite in certain common areas, per the Reserve Study; approved proposal from Saguaro Aquatics for Continental Ranch swim lessons; approved 2021 pool monitor budget; and postponed decision for more information regarding Windmill Park field trash can replace.

At the April 20, 2021 meeting, the Board approved several Covenants Committee recommendations

for fines and pool use suspensions for various unresolved violations; approved proposal from Tree Frogs to make improvements to the playground on Yellow Moon Dr. and Veridian Dr.; did not approve request for a Little Free Pantry; did not approve request to increase pool heater temperature from 82 degrees; amended and approved a revision to the Design Guidelines 'Guest Residence' section as recommended by the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) – revised amendment referred back to ARC for review; approved variance request for detached garage addition; appointed two new members to Landscape Committee and one new member to ARC; postponed decision for marquee sign replace; approved proposal from Tree Frogs to replace trash can on West end of Windmill Park sport's field; approved proposal from Goodmans Interior Solutions to install new office storage cabinets; appointed Nominating Committee members; and approved proposal from Sovereign Electric to replace first phase of monument LED lights, per the Reserve Study.

The community manager provided her report to the board which included the status of all projects recently completed and/or currently underway since the previous Board meeting.

# Waste Management in Continental Ranch



In an effort to help clarify some confusion that has been surfacing recently, there are some facts about Waste Management's relationship & participation in Continental Ranch which may be relevant.

Continental Ranch does not have a contract with Waste Management and does not have any control over Waste Management's pricing. CRCA residents are welcome to use any trash service provider they prefer, so long as the trash service provider picks up on Mondays and/or Thursdays.

Many years ago there did exist a contract between Waste Management and CRCA, however it expired in 2012 and was never renewed. Any rate increases or service changes implemented by Waste Management are at their sole discretion. Service plans

are held directly between the service provider company and its customers (Continental Ranch residents); the HOA does not have any involvement with those plans.

Recently, the HOA received multiple calls from concerned residents who were told a number of differing erroneous explanations from the Waste Management customer service department regarding service charge fees or withholding of certain discounts. Essentially, Waste Management was blaming their fees on the HOA. The CRCA management office has been in communication with Waste Management's HOA department in an attempt to correct the information being released by their customer service department.

If you are a Waste Management customer and have questions or concerns about your Waste Management account, please contact Waste Management customer service. If the information you're provided by Waste Management is contrary to the information in this article, it may be necessary to speak with a manager in their department.

The bottom line: any pricing adjustments at Waste Management are not a result of anything to do with the Continental Ranch Community Association. If residents are unhappy with their service provider, they are welcome to change providers. Hopefully, these clarification points are helpful.

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# Landscape Corner - May Do's & Don'ts


- ✓ Plant Bermuda lawns when soil warms up in early May. Fertilize Bermuda grass lawns each month beginning late April or early May.
- ✓ Mow your lawn down to half of an inch until the winter rye grass dies. This encourages new growth and is healthy for the Bermuda lawn.



- ✓ Every few years your Bermuda will need to be dethatched when the thatch layer becomes more than ½" in depth.
- ✓ Water grass early in the morning to minimize evaporation.
- ✓ When temperatures hit triple digits it will be necessary to schedule watering towards your most least drought tolerant, shallow rooted plants. If this becomes a daily requirement to keep the plants hydrated, consider changing to a less water intensive plant.
- ✔ Plant young citrus trees. Two to five year old trees transplant most successfully. Don't
- ✓ expect fruit for a few years. Water fruit trees on a 7 to 10 day deep watering cycle for the summer. The resulting fruit will be larger.
- ✓ For newly planted trees, protect trunk from sunburn. Stake newer trees to protect them from summer wind storms.
- Transplant cactus plants in May.
- ✓ Increase water to shrubs as the weather warms. Don't water the Bougainvillea too much. You'll get bigger leaves and fewer flowers.



- ✓ Fertilize established roses at two week intervals.
- ✔ Remove petunias, pansies, geraniums. Plant summer flowers, such as Lantana, Vinca, Verbana, Portulaca, Gomphorena purple buddy, and Perslane.
- ✔ Flowers will benefit from a planting mix high in organic content. Don't cheat on soil preparation for new flowers and vegetables. Add compost as needed and till in well for good soil drainage. Bone meal and blood meal are great organic amendments to add to the soil. Be sure to include a granular fertilizer that contains at least 20% phosphorus to help with root establishment. Weekly applications of liquid fertilizer like miracle grow for the first month will help establish the plants quickly.
- ✓ Plant seeds for black eyed peas, cantaloupe, muskmelon, squash, okra.
- ✔ Plant transplants for Jerusalem artichokes, sweet potatoes
- ✓ Provide shade for tomatoes. Shade cloth with 50% reduction is recommended.
- ✔ Vegetables will benefit from a rich soil mixture of compost.



- ✓ branches obstructing pathways, views, or structures.
- ✓ Do not use pre-emergent herbicides in an area where you intend to plant seeds.
- ✓ Spot treat pest problems.
- ✓ Don't use overhead spray watering for irrigating anything but turf if possible. Drip irrigation or bubbler irrigation is more efficient for deep watering of shrubs and trees.





# June Do's & Don'ts

- ✓ Plant your Bermuda lawns if you haven't already. Apply iron to your lawn once per month.
- ✓ If it's time to dethatch, do it during the active growing season, May through August. Dethatch every two years at a minimum to rejuvenate the grass.
- ✔ Pick early-maturing deciduous fruit to prevent bird damage, and ripen fruit at room temperature.
- ✓ June is the driest month, so plants may need more water. Apply mulch to the ground around heat sensitive plants keep the roots cooler and prevent evaporation.
- ✓ Apply chelated iron to bottle brush, pyracantha, silk oak, and other plants with iron deficiency symptoms.
- ✓ Heat tolerant plants can be planted right through the summer months. They will need to be watered on a regular basis until fall.
- Transplant palms, mesquites, palo verdes, and other arid shrubs and trees in the heat of the summer for best results.
- Prune bougainvillea and lantana to stimulate growth and blooms.
- ✓ Fertilize hibiscus and palms with palm tree food and keep watered. For established hibiscus, prune back about one-third of the new growth.



- ✓ Cut back on fertilizing established roses to encourage plants to slow down for the hot summer.
- ✓ Water roses deeply as temperatures rise. Hose off roses in the early morning to increase humidity and control spider mites.
- ✔ Flowers for summer color include: celosia, coreopsis, cosmos, gazanias, globe amaranth, portulaca, zinnia, salvia, vinca (periwinkle), gomphorena, verbena, pentas, potato vine, dusty miller and angelonia (summer snaps).
- ✓ Flowerbeds will need irrigation every other day through the summer. Use ammonium phosphate in flower beds to increase and keep flowers blooming. Remove spent blooms from annual flowers to encourage new blooms.
- ✔ Plant seeds for cucumbers, squash, cantaloupe, muskmelon. Plant transplants: sweet potatoes
- ✓ Keep plants moist. Wilted leaves in the morning are a sign of moisture stress. Late afternoon wilting may be heat stress.
- ✓ Use sunscreens that offer no more than 50% sun reduction. As your melons come in, place a board beneath them. This will keep them off the moist soil and prevent insects from attacking them.
- ✔ Begin harvesting onions and garlic.



- ✓ Don't over water. Yes, it's very hot in the desert in June, so it might seem like watering more is the answer. Not necessarily true. Water slowly (prevents run off), deeply (use a soil probe or a long handled screwdriver to check that the water is penetrating 2-3 ft. deep for trees and shrubs, and 1-1½ ft. deep for turf & flowers), and infrequently (let the soil dry between watering).
- ✓ Do not prune citrus during the summer.
- ✔ Don't shade corn, squash, melons, black-eyed peas, okra, or grapes.
- ✓ Don't add fertilizer to dry soil. If you apply dry fertilizer on dry soil and water it in, the fertilizer is carried toward the roots as a concentrated solution and will burn them. Always water first, then apply fertilizers to moist soils, and then continue with the rest of the water.



TREES & SHRUBS



I hope this note finds everyone feeling well and in good spirits. Spring is still in the morning air, but is already preparing to make way for summer. The sun is shining bright, as is the light at the end of this long tunnel we have been in for a little over a year now.

Based on recent reports and observations, I believe it is important to remind everyone to properly dispose of all garbage, tree trimmings, and landscape material. Too often, this material is found behind rear walls, in washes, common areas and other places. Depositing waste on another's property, whether public or private, is a criminal violation of the law. Please make sure you properly dispose of all waste, as the cost to do it right is substantially less than the potential fines for getting caught doing it wrong.

We have also recently come across signs of people setting out food for wildlife in a couple of areas, so I want to remind everyone that this is a violation of the law. Arizona Revised Statute 13-2927 makes it unlawful to feed wildlife or attract wildlife into an area, with very few exceptions. Whatever your intentions, please remember that feeding wildlife ultimately causes harm to the animal and their natural habitat while increasing potential risk to residents and domestic animals in the area.

With regards to domestic animals, although we strongly encourage responsible pet ownership, we also realize that accidents do happen and there may be a time when your pet gets loose outside the property. When this happens, the best way to ensure your pet is safely returned to you is to license your dogs and microchip your dogs and cats. To assist with this, we will once again be hosting a free microchip clinic for dogs and cats on Sunday, June 27th between 9:00-11:00 a.m. The clinic will be at Ora Mae Harn District Park, near the Community Center. An appointment is not required. Please keep your eyes open for the event flier or call Marana Animal Services at (520) 382-8020 for additional information.

Take care, stay safe and healthy, and enjoy all southern Arizona has to offer over the next couple of months. 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

# Management's Message

Last call for May 1st assessments! Please bring payments to the office by May 16th to avoid the \$15 late fee. At their April meeting, the Board voted to continue all COVID-19 safety precautions currently in place for the office, meetings, and Community Center event rentals. They plan to reassess at each monthly Board meeting and are hopeful these restrictions can be lifted soon. I'm happy to report that three new members have joined the committees and I would like to congratulate them all for choosing to serve this community!

As most Continental Ranch swimmers know, the Windmill Park pool lane line was irreparably broken due to improper use from a resident and their guests in April. The Board has addressed the incident with the homeowner at fault and approved for two new lane lines to be ordered (the second one to be a backup). While the order has been placed, the lane lines are not expected to arrive until the end of May due to increased demand on pool equipment, according to the manufacturer. We considered using the Community Center lane line in the meantime, but the Community Center's 25-meter pool lane line won't fit in the Windmill Park's 25-yard pool. As we kick off the busiest time of the pool season, please be respectful of equipment and furniture in the pool areas and remember - floating pool noodles and loungers are welcome!

The National Weather Service recently put out their prediction that Monsoon 2021 will bring above average rainfall to Arizona, which is cause for hope to all of us desert rats. The summer rains also bring weeds, and CRCA common areas receive a proactive spraying of pre-emergent in early June. When used correctly, pre-emergent prevents seeds from germinating in the first place, and does not affect already established plants, which means it's best to apply before the first rain. Anytime between now and the start of the Monsoon is a great time to try it out in your yard, and I would encourage residents to look into it if you haven't already.
