I hope you had a great summer and are looking forward to the cooler weather. Just a friendly reminder that although the Community Center pool closed after Labor Day, the Windmill Pool is still open and heated through the end of November.

The Board recently approved a proposal from Kappcon, Inc. to replace the splash pad's underground surge tank, which will get done while the Windmill Pool is closed this January through February. The current plastic tank that cracked earlier this year will be replaced with a pre-cast concrete tank, which is now industry standard and expected to last for years to come.

Mark your calendars and don't forget to come and get your picture taken with Santa on December 9th! Check inside the newsletter for more details and we hope to see you all there.

In case you missed it, the Annual Meeting took place in October, where four members were elected to the Board. Long-time Board member, Bill Dawes, decided not to run this year, and I would like to take this opportunity to thank him for volunteering his time over the past 10-plus years to this community.

September and October Recap:

Board Meeting at a Glance

The following are highlights from the regular meeting of the Board of Directors held September 19, 2023 and October 17, 2023 at the community center. Completed minutes will be posted to the website after they are approved at the next appropriate meeting. A copy of approved minutes may also be requested from the office. Recordings of all meetings will be retained for a period of 30 days following posting of approved minutes to the website.

Board Actions

At the September 19, 2023 meeting, the Board approved several Covenants Committee recommendations for fines and pool use suspensions for various unresolved violations; approved incorporating safety information related to local wildlife in an upcoming edition of the newsletter; approved Procedure for the 2023 CRCA Election; appointed Mr. Larry Lemieux to the Landscape Committee; approved only overseeding the Windmill Park sport's field with ryegrass this winter; approved proposal from Brijer Resources to remove one arm from a saguaro cactus leaning on a residential wall; approved proposal from Approved Painting to clean and repaint a trash can receptacle at The Villas pocket park; approved renewal of the contract with HOA Management Solutions; approved increasing assessment late fees from \$15.00 to \$18.00; approved proposal from Kappcon, Inc. to replace the splash pad surge tank; approved access easement agreement in the Sonoran Moon subdivision; approved the 2023-2024 Annual Budget with assessment increase; and approved a homeowner request to host an event in the Windmill Park baseball field.

At the October 17, 2023 meeting, the Board approved several Covenants Committee recommendations for fines and pool use suspensions for various unresolved violations; approved a 30-day extension on fines for unapproved trash pick-up day violations; approved hiring BCL Yard Services to perform violation lot cleanups on a trial basis; approved proposal from Oasis Pool Service to replace the community center kiddie pool automatic chlorinator; approved proposal from Connect Security to replace one broken security camera; and approved opening a CD for Reserve funds at Alliance Association Bank.

Manager's Report

The community manager and assistant manager provided their reports to the board which included the status of all projects recently completed and/or currently underway since the previous Board meeting.

Covenants Corner - Exterior House Paint

Over the past year, readers of this newsletter probably noticed a previous mention of a growing number of homes throughout the community which are showing signs of wear, and which need to be painted. The time has now come, and in October the CRCA management staff began conducting a thorough inspection of all homes in Continental Ranch to evaluate which ones are in need of maintenance. The first batch of letters should be mailed out by mid-November.

The CRCA Board of Directors understands that home maintenance (especially painting) can be costly, and with the holidays coming up, this



first notification will gently give homeowners up to six months to complete the work. The Board hopes that folks will take advantage of this grace period to perform the required maintenance and/or painting. When it comes to home maintenance, it can be an awkward conversation for the HOA to have with its homeowners, but it is necessary to keep the community in great shape and preserve property values for the long term.

In general, a change in the color of the home does require prior approval from the Architectural Review Committee (ARC). If you receive a letter regarding painting your home and have questions, including how to apply to ARC, please contact the office at 520-297-7600.

Association Dues Reminder

It's that time again...the semi-annual assessments are due November 1st and homeowners should have already received their statements in the mail.

Payments can be made either online, mailed to the office in the form of a check or money order, dropped off at the office during business hours, or placed in the drop box located just outside the office entrance anytime (check or money orders only and please make sure the account number or property address is included on the payment).

To make a payment online, please visit www.crcatucson.com to access the secure management portal website, and if you need assistance with your password, or if you would like to discuss a payment plan, please contact the office at (520) 297-7600.

Monthly payments break out to around \$30 per month and many residents find this monthly rate to be more manageable than paying the lump assessments twice per year. If you would like to begin monthly pre-payments, please contact our office at (520) 297-7600 for more details. If you are already enrolled in the Auto-ACH payment service, your statement will include this note at the top of the payment coupon: "Balance to be paid by Autopay (ACH), and your payment will be automatically posted on November 15th."

The grace period extends through November 15th before a \$18.00 late fee will be applied. Online payments must be made prior to 6:00 p.m. on November 15th to avoid a late fee. Thank you to all who have already paid their assessment.

Wild Neighbors: Javelina

Javelinas and dogs are not a good mix. There are far more javelina attacks on dogs than humans, and most human injuries occur while they are trying to protect their dog during an attack. Javelinas react to dogs the same way they do with coyotes. They perceive both canines as a serious threat to their young, and a dog barking is also perceived as a threat to the herd. If you see a herd of javelinas while taking your dog(s) for a walk, we advise you to turn around and walk away from the herd.





When dealing with wildlife intruding on your property or business, it's safest to let the experts handle it. Cal 911 in an emergency. Landscape Corner - November Do's & Don'ts

Thank you AAA Landscape for providing these helpful landscaping tips and tricks.



- ✓ Bermuda should be watered with one inch of water each week. Bermuda will become dormant as temperatures drop to below 50 degrees.
- Over seeding should have been done by now.
- ✓ Winter ryegrass should be mowed to 1-1/2 to 2 inches. Keep watering until established and then water only about once a week.



- Yellowing of the winter lawn may occur when the cold weather sets in. An application of ammonium nitrate will bring back the dark green color.
- ✓ Cut back watering of all trees and shrubs, but continue to water deep. Don't over water or fungus will grow.
- ✓ Plant 3-5 gallon shrubs and 10-15 gallon trees.
- ✓ Clean dead branches out of trees and shrubs.
- ✓ Trim unwanted sprouts from the interior of your citrus trees. This makes it easier to harvest fruit.
- ✓ Keep the skirt of your citrus trees pruned and trimmed to about two or three feet from the ground. This permits a better air flow and minimizes chances of fungus.
- ✓ Plant in full sun: petunias, calendulas, dianthus and snapdragons
- ✓ Plant in part sun or shade: dianthus, geraniums, impatients, and primrose
- ✓ Keep spent rose blooms pruned.



- Plant bulbs in well-drained soil that is also high in compost or organic matter. Your bulbs should be planted with about two inches of sand beneath them. Cover with a coarse material such as peat moss or crushed wood products, such as bark. Plant Amaryllis, Anemone, Calla and Easter Lily, Dutch Crocus, Daffodil, Freesia, Gladiolus, Iris, and Ranunculus.
- ✓ Planting in clusters rather than in rows makes for a nice arrangement. Bulbs should be given a good soaking
- ✓ immediately after planting, and every seven to ten days after growth begins.
- ✓ Now is the time to plant seeds for beets, bok choy, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, celery, chard, collards, endive, kale, lettuce, mustard, onions, parsley, peas, radishes, rutabaga, spinach, and turnips.
- ✓ Transplants in November include asparagus, broccoli, brussel sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, chard, and lettuce.
- When you plant any of the many varieties of leaf lettuce you can harvest and the plant will keep growing new leaves. You don't have to pick the whole head of lettuce.
 - ✓ Don't water the lawn when it's dark.
 - ✓ Do not fertilize frost-tender plants such as bottlebrush, bougainvillea, oleander and citrus.
 - ✓ Don't procrastinate about preparing for cold weather. Toward the end of November we can get frost, and your garden will be at risk if you don't cover tender plants, flowers and vegetables.
 - ✓ Don't ignore weeds. Either pull them later, or use pre-emergent now.

Landscape Corner - December Do's & Don'ts


PREPARE FOR FROSTS NOW.


If you don't care for your sensitive trees, bushes, flowers and vegetables before the first frost, it's probably too late, since the first frost will permanently damage them. It is not uncommon to have up to 20 frosty mornings in December. Be prepared to cover those frost-tender plants throughout December.

✓ Your over-seeded winter lawn should be established by now. If your winter lawn turns yellowish, fertilize. An application of Ironite will bring back the dark green color.



- ✓ Water every 5-7 days, or more often if you notice a drying-out of the soil. Light or sandy soils dry out faster.
- ✓ Wrap the trunks of young citrus and other cold-tender trees with cloth, cardboard or several layers of newspaper (no plastic) to protect them from frost. Leave them wrapped until the threat of frost has passed.






- ✔ Remove dead branches and water sprouts.
- ✓ CHRISTMAS TREES When you purchase your tree, try to get a freshly cut tree. Feel the needles for dryness; the needles should be pliable. Cut an inch off the trunk, put it in a stand with a water reservoir and fill it daily. If you buy a living tree, don't bring it inside until about a week before Christmas and take it back outside right after the holiday. After the tree has been outside for a while and is again acclimated to the colder weather, you can plant it or donate it to a school or park.
- ✔ Plant seeds: beets, broccoli, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, garlic bulbs, green onions, leeks, lettuce, parsley, peas, radishes, swiss chard, spinach and turnips.
 - ✓ Plant transplants: asparagus, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce (head & leaf)
 - ✔ Flowers can still be planted so choose your favorite annuals and perennials.
 - ✓ You can still plant bulbs. Plant them in well-drained soil that is also high in compost or organic matter. Your bulbs should be planted with about two inches of sand beneath them. Cover with a coarse material such as peat moss or crushed wood products, such as bark.
 - Chrysanthemums begin to die back after blooming. Cut back dead or dying foliage and add a bit of nitrogen fertilizer.

Poinsettias will turn yellow if you water them with the foil sleeve still on because they will sit in the water. Take them to the sink, remove the foil sleeve, water until water comes out the bottom, let them drain for a few minutes and then put the foil sleeve back on.

- ✔ Don't pick grapefruit yet. Grapefruit are the best in late spring or early summer.
- ✔ Don't fertilize trees or shrubs in December. Wait until Spring.
- ✓ Don't over water.
- ✔ Don't ignore pest problems.

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


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
